**VIEWING THINGS PROPERLY**

*Ecclesiastes 1:1, "The words of the Preacher, the son of David, king in Jerusalem."*

We and our children live in a world fallen in sin and under the curse. God has given to us the book of Ecclesiastes to instruct us with spiritual wisdom and to teach us a proper world-and-life view. The theme of Ecclesiastes is "the vanity of man's life in a fallen and sinful world." This vanity of man's life exists because of sin and God's judgment upon it. The idea of the word "vanity" is that of a breath or a vapor. The idea is that of futility or emptiness. The Preacher in Ecclesiastes will expose all of life to this vanity and there are many topics examined from many points of view.

However, God is realizing His counsel and purpose. The inspired writer (Solomon) teaches that life has meaning and value by having faith in Jesus Christ. One of the main purposes of the book is to guard the child of God (especially the youth) from the folly of the world that seeks its life and happiness here below. The true meaning of life and its purpose cannot be found in this world "under the sun". I mention briefly just a couple of topics taken from the first chapter which must be taught to our sons and daughters.

*Ecclesiastes 1:3, "What profit hath a man of all his labour which he taketh under the sun?"*

Solomon first examines the idea of labor. What does it profit? What does man's labor really accomplish? What of his labor abides? Man comes into the world naked, with nothing, and with what does he leave? Nothing! And how long is his name remembered? Life and death – a seemingly never-ending cycle. The Preacher points us to the creation itself to help us see this aspect of labor and vanity. He draws our attention to what are not merely natural processes but the work of God, the Creator. The creation itself is in constant motion and activity (it is full of labor). The cycles of the sunrise and sunset (verse 5), the blowing of the wind from north to south and whirling continually (verse 6), the rivers flowing into the sea and yet the sea is not full – the water cycle (verse 7) - demonstrate vanity. We must point these things out to the children. Nothing ever has fullness on the earth; it is all going in circles. All the labor of man and of the creation is a weary burden because it neither satisfies nor obtains an enduring end.

So we must warn the children "Don't be deceived. Don't make life a striving to heap up! It is foolish." Rather the Preacher will teach us that only by pressing all into the service of God with thanksgiving will we experience any happiness and purpose in life. Jesus warns us in Luke 12:15, "And he (Jesus) said unto them, take heed and beware of covetousness, for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth.

*Ecclesiastes 1:10, "Is there any thing whereof  
it may be said, See, this is new? it hath been  
already of old time, which was before us."*

A second important truth which Solomon teaches in the opening chapter of Ecclesiastes is that there is nothing new under the sun. Here too is a false delusion of which to warn the children. For man would try to convince us otherwise, boasting that he has achieved something NEW. But the Preacher is looking at the underlying principle or essence of things. The developments in science and technology may have the appearance of something new in some external form, but transportation is transportation, whether you ride on a donkey or speed away in a bullet train. The same is true of communication. Whether you handwrite a letter, email using a computer, or text using your smartphone, there is no advancement in life itself, but man the sinner only obtains more abundant ways to sin.

Of man and all his activity, there is nothing new under the sun because he is finite and fallen into sin. That which is new can only be of God and that by a wonder of His grace. The Preacher points us to God and the new things which He alone has wrought in Jesus Christ. Herein is wisdom!

### EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

We are thankful to God that he has so ordered things that we have been able to continue in-person learning at Hope School during this school year. Being able to work with students face to face makes a big difference in their ability to grasp concepts and in the teachers' ability to understand their needs. A little more than 2 months remain in this school year and absences due to COVID cases are way down compared to 1<sup>st</sup> semester. We thank all the volunteers and substitute teachers who have graciously stepped in to keep our school running smoothly during this year.

From our perspective the school year is moving swiftly. Already in January the Education Committee began looking toward the 2021-22 school year this fall by conducting annual interviews with our teachers, advertising and interviewing for openings in our teaching staff, and giving recommendations for the 2021-22 budget line items under the supervision of this committee.

During three evenings in January and February we met with each teacher, as well as our administrator and secretary for the annual teacher interviews with a view to renewing contracts for the coming school year. This good practice also provides a forum for the board, through its committee, to stay in close contact with our staff and to express our appreciation on behalf of all the parents for their faithful labors. The committee had a very profitable time with the teachers and staff and came away deeply thankful to God for providing us these Protestant

Reformed teachers who stand in our place each day. The theme for the interviews was, *Maintaining Covenant Education during COVID – Challenges & Opportunities*. In that connection we read together *Heidelberg Catechism Lord's Day 10 on God's Providence*.

Q. 27. *What dost thou mean by the providence of God?*

A. *The almighty and everywhere present power of God, whereby, as it were by His hand, He upholds and governs heaven, earth, and all creatures; so that herbs and grass, rain and drought, fruitful and barren years, meat and drink, **health and sickness**, riches and poverty, yea, and all things **come**, not by chance, **but by His fatherly hand**.*

Q. 28. *What advantage is it to us to know that God has created, and by His providence doth still uphold all things?*

A. ***That we may be patient in adversity**; thankful in prosperity; and that in all things which may hereafter befall us, **we place our firm trust in our faithful God and Father**, that nothing shall separate us from His love; since all creatures are so in His hand, that without His will they cannot so much as move.*

These teachers join together with us to carry out the calling we have as parents to rear God's covenant children to spiritual maturity. We thank God that there continues to be close unity and cooperation between our teachers and parents in this work.

We are happy to report that all full-time staff who were planning to return next year have signed and returned their contracts. We will have a new 7<sup>th</sup> grade homeroom teacher next year. Jill Reitsma has ably taught 7th grade this year but desires to go back to helping in the Discovery program part-time next year. We welcome her back to that position. We are very pleased to report that Ethan Kalsbeek has signed a contract for the 7<sup>th</sup> grade homeroom position for next fall. Ethan is a former student of Hope School. Ethan has taught grades 5-8 the last two years at the Protestant Reformed School of Wingham and the previous five years teaching grades 4-6 at Genesis Protestant Reformed School in Lacombe. He is now making plans to move his family back to Michigan. We welcome Ethan to Hope School!

We will also have a new 6<sup>th</sup> grade teacher for next year. Due to Jason Boone's decision to leave the Protestant Reformed Churches, the board recently decided to dismiss Jason from his teaching position because the *Constitution for the Society of Hope Protestant Reformed School* requires that all teaching staff be communicant members in good standing in the Protestant Reformed Churches. We do express our appreciation for the work that Jason has done over the last three years at Hope School and we thank God for providing him as a means to instruct our covenant children during this time. We thank Mary Brummel, Miki Kooiker, and Stephanie Daling for filling in until the end of the school year to teach the 6<sup>th</sup> grade. The Education Committee has conducted interviews to fill this position for next year but at the time of this writing, no teacher has signed a contract for this position.

Pray for your board members who represent you in operating the school and pray for our teachers who stand in your place each day.

## FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee continues to meet every month, counting and recording all of the income received. This issue of the *Highlights* contains a summary of this information in our most recent Financial Statement. This end of February Income Statement is the 8<sup>th</sup> report out of 12, therefore our goal would be to see that expenses and revenue are about 67% of the annual budget. The bottom line shows our income at 73% of budget, and our expenses at 63% of budget, with \$114,713.39 of net income.

We will be starting the spring deficit drive shortly. The drive amount collected through February is \$219,368, which is 61% of our budgeted annual amount of \$315,000. We will send out spring drive letters and forms to collect the remaining amount balance of \$95,632. Over 26% of the school's income comes from the deficit drives and it is important to collect this money in order to maintain a balanced budget.

We would like to remind all tuition-paying families that their last tuition payment should be made in May. All tuition should be paid by June 1. We have emailed tuition statements every month, shortly after our Finance Committee meeting. Please review your statement closely to make sure that you are on track to have your last tuition payment in the office before the 1<sup>st</sup> of June.

We are very thankful that the financial picture for Hope School remains sound, and we thank God for the means to support our schools.

## LET'S GET CAUGHT READING!

If you were to take a quick and simple poll, which category would your child fall into?

- A. LOVES to read!
- B. Could take it or leave it.
- C. Really dislikes reading – a lot.

Our goal at Hope school - and I'm guessing your goal at home too – is to get your child into the first category mentioned above – LOVES to read. That is why we have been celebrating March as Reading Month – our desire is to encourage a love of reading and to make sure that our students “get caught reading.” Here at school we have been taking part in a number of activities that encourage reading. Some examples are: Book Character Day, Read a T – shirt day, Poem day, and Teacher Swap day when teachers will switch classrooms and read to the kids in another grade. We are also having school wide scheduled DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) time as well as Get Caught Reading Prizes. We are halfway through March as I write this, and so far the reading activities have been a huge success and enjoyed by staff and students alike. However, as great as this is, the ultimate goal of reading month is to encourage children to read all year long. For some, that can be a struggle and a real challenge. Reading can be hard work for a struggling student, and will not be considered interesting or enjoyable. For others, reading isn't hard work, but it is not interesting or exciting either. The question is then, “How can you get your child from disliking reading to loving and enjoying it? How do you motivate your child to read?” The following are some creative ways to encourage your child so that they are often caught reading!

1. **Make time for reading.** Reading should not be shoved into a jam packed schedule so that it seems like an unwelcome chore. Allow reading to be a relaxed and enjoyable time, free from pressure.
2. **Set aside a regular read-aloud time.** Choose a wide variety of high quality literature that appeals to your child's age and interests. Audio books also make a great option for a reluctant reader. And don't abandon read-aloud time as your children get older – although your teenager might not admit it – no one is too old for a great read-aloud. 😊
3. **Make sure that the reading material isn't beyond your child's reading abilities.** Even if the interest is there, if the book is too hard to read, the motivation will be lost.
4. **Create a cozy reading nook.** A special reading space may be all the encouragement your child needs to settle down and spend time with a good book!
5. **Look for a wide variety of reading material.** Kids often gravitate toward the fiction shelves at the library, but don't let them stop there. There are many other genres to consider: non-fiction, joke books, how-to books, biographies etc.
6. **Try buddy reading with your struggling reader.** Buddy reading can help improve a child's fluency and make him feel more comfortable with reading on his own.
7. **Have your reluctant reader read easy picture books to younger siblings.** This provides excellent practice, yet it doesn't feel like work.
8. **Let humor work its magic!** Read up to a certain part and then stop reading. If your child wants to hear the rest and find out what happens next, he'll have to read it himself!



9. **Exhibit a love of reading!** When kids observe that older siblings and adults love to read, they are more likely to develop a love of reading themselves!
10. **Provide access to books.** Use the public library. Use your school library. Create a home library. Be sure that whenever your child decides he wants to read, there is a book waiting at his fingertips. Make it possible that you and your kids “Get Caught Reading!”

## MORNING BLESSINGS

In past years when I was an aide here at Hope School I would walk down the hall and hear the different classrooms singing for morning devotions. It was such a joy to hear them singing the Psalms that we hold so dear. Now, as a teacher, I am able to participate in this and it is one of my favorite times of the day. At the beginning of second grade we sing a lot of the same songs over and over, but soon the second graders become better readers and as they become more proficient with the Psalter, they begin to branch out and pick a variety of new songs.

As we sing the different songs in the morning, I am struck by how many of them speak of trusting in God as He is our refuge and our help. What a comfort this is! This past year has been filled with much heartache and trials for so many of God's people. There have been many afflicted with sickness. Many mourn for loved ones who have died. There is turmoil in our churches that affect our families. There is anxiety over what is taking place in the world. We find ourselves trusting in earthly things and we become anxious and despairing. Then we can sing the words to Psalter #7: "In God's love abiding, I have joy and peace...In His care confiding, I will sweetly sleep, for the Lord, my Savior, will in safety keep." Often we can become so anxious that we cannot sleep. Here we sing that when we trust in God we can sleep

peacefully for we know that God is taking care of us. These words remind us that it is only in God that we have true peace.

Psalter 100 is also filled with comforting words. We sing "Rest in the Lord with quiet trust, wait patiently for Him; tho' wickedness triumphant seem, Let not thy faith grow dim." We see so much wickedness all around us. We fear for our little children who have to grow up amidst all this wickedness. We worry for our young people who have to fight temptations all around them and we get overwhelmed, but then the words of the Psalmist point us back to Christ and remind us to put our trust in God and to have faith in God's promises.

I am so thankful that I can begin my day singing these songs of praise to God with my students. As singing is such an important part of the lives of the child of God and the Psalter numbers are so precious to us, I wanted my students to think about the words of their favorite songs and not just the tunes. ## THE STEADY EYE

*Let thine eyes look right on, and let thine eyelids look straight before thee.  
Proverbs 4:25*

God warns us many times in Proverbs about disobedience. In this section of Proverbs, however, we are told how to obey Him, how to keep the heart for out of it are the issues of life. God just commanded us to put away a froward mouth. He now gives us direction regarding our eyes.

Our five senses connect us physically to creation. They are also inlets to our souls. How we observe and interact with the creation influences our spiritual life. This is especially true for our eyes. Christ warns us, "The light of the body is the eye: if therefore thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light." Jesus also warns us about the evil eye and the resulting spiritual darkness.

Knowing that our eyes exert a powerful influence in our lives, Solomon instructs us on how to use our eyes properly. We are to "look right on." Satan knows how powerful temptations presented through our eyes can be. The things on which we fix our eyes will direct the soul. The inspired apostle Peter knew this as well. He wrote of those who departed from the truth, "Having eyes full of adultery and that cannot cease from sin, beguiling unstable souls: an heart they have exercised with covetous practices; cursed children:" (2 Peter 2:14). This is clear to us in today's entertainment. The music, dancing and various forms of video presentations display to our eyes a world full of adultery which cannot satisfy a depraved desire for sin, and the world's lack of moderation in its use of alcohol fuels the fire of hedonistic passion.

Eyes have often led people into sin. Lot's wife did not keep her eyes straight ahead. She turned to see the overthrow of Sodom and Gomorrah, evidently desiring the life she had enjoyed there, and was turned to a pillar of salt. During the destruction of Jericho, Achan saw among the spoils some treasures which he desired. He coveted, took the accursed thing, and all Israel suffered the consequences in a humiliating defeat. Then there is David. Instead of keeping his eyes fixed on the enemy on the battlefield, he stayed in Jerusalem where his wandering eye saw Bathsheba. His life would never be the same.

There are examples of eyes which are looking straight at a goal. The idea is someone who looks steadily at a mark in order to walk a straight path. When I mow my lawn in a diagonal pattern, I do not have the edge of the driveway or side of the road to keep the mower lines nice and straight. I must pick a spot where the grass meets the road on the opposite side of the lawn, stare at it and walk as straight as I can toward it. When I'm successful, the result is a nice, straight pattern.

Job directed his eyes this way. He did not want adulterous thoughts to enter his heart, so "I made a covenant with mine eyes; why then should I think upon a maid?" (Job 31:1) He would not allow his eyes to wander so as to arouse sinful desires. He would be careful with his eyes. Joseph did this though his master's wife certainly did not keep her eyes fixed on godliness. We read, "his master's wife cast her eyes upon Joseph; and she said, Lie with me." (Gen. 39:7) With her eyes she recognized Joseph to be attractive and desired to satisfy her sinful passion.

Joseph, however, guarded his eyes. In fact, Joseph would not even allow himself to be in the same room as she so his eyes could not fall upon her and lead him into temptation.

We must keep our eyes straight before us, on the single goal of glorifying God. Our eyes must be on the path God sets before us by His law. Keeping our eyes fixed shows our gratitude for all the blessings He has given to us in Christ. The pleasures of sin do not lie in the path of God's law. Distractions to a thankful life lie to the right and left. If we allow our eyes to wander from the single purpose of living a thankful life, we expose ourselves to myriad temptations. Were we to follow our eyes, seek the things of this world and satisfy the desires of the old man of sin, we would lose the feeling of God's favor. We would no longer feel the spiritual warmth of God's gracious countenance which is more than life to us. (Canons V, Art. 5 & 13)

Which brings us to eyelids. "Let thine eyelids look straight before thee." None of the commentaries on my bookshelf mentioned the significance of why Solomon switches from "eyes" to "eyelids." However, there must be more to the divine inspiration of scripture than allowing writers' literary discretion to avoid dull repetition of terms.

Here is my attempt in dealing with "eyelids." When I walk a pathway which is smooth and has nothing which would cause me to stumble, I can keep my eyes up to see distant things and enjoy the scenery. However, when the path has many obstacles and I must place each step carefully, my eyes are down. This is when someone coming from the opposite direction sees my eyelids, not my eyes. In the next verse Solomon writes, "Ponder the path of thy feet," which has the idea of having to walk carefully. We must have our eyelids straight before us when the path of life becomes more difficult or presents more dangers.

We must take this admonition seriously. Living a Christian life is no joke. This world is not a place of amusement for us. God does not call us to serve ourselves. We may not live a frivolous life. We are engaged in a serious spiritual battle. The stakes are high. Satan is as a lion seeking his prey, and we had better be alert, keep our eyes fixed straight before us and not allow our eyes to see the sinful distractions which the world offers. If we cannot control our eyes, if we realize they constantly lead us into sin, Christ instructs us, "And if thy right eye offend thee, pluck it out, and cast it from thee: for it is profitable for thee that one of thy members should perish, and not that thy whole body should be cast into hell." (Mt. 5:29) It is that serious.

Being careful about the use of our eyes is an aspect of keeping our hearts. We must protect our spiritual eyes at all times. We want to enjoy fellowship with God through grateful living. This is the true life of our hearts. May God help us and our children to have our eyes look right on, and let our eyelids look straight before us.

The words of Luka's pharmacist father sticks in his mind, "You have the tools to heal yourself." These are the words that helped him when on a loving couple's farm, a long trek in the mountains in Germany, and an encounter with the underground Ukrainian Insurgent Army hideout. He is so set on surviving, that at one point, Luka even kills a Nazi soldier to stay alive. After the war, Luka searches with perseverance for his precious work-camp friend, Lida, and his loving parents. The author continues to show the double sided tyranny that many Ukrainians experienced.
