Is Hope School mission minded? If by that question, one is asking if the function and purpose of the instruction is to save the children, then the answer is no. The Christian school's purpose is not to evangelize, that's the churches' work and calling. That is not to say that the school has no interest in the salvation of the children. It is, in fact, on the basis of the biblical teaching of the organic nature of the covenant, the Lord's promise to save the children of believing parents, that the Christian school has its purpose and function. The children are not to be viewed as unregenerate little heathens in need of salvation, but they are to be viewed as tender lambs to be nurtured and reared in the fear of the Lord, to the utmost of our power.

Hope School mission minded? Oh, yes! That mission must be known and understood by all involved in operation of this good Christian school. The mission must drive all the activities of the Christian school. Parents, teachers, and students must be working together to accomplish this mission. That mission can be expressed succinctly in a couple paragraphs written in the Parent/Student Handbook.

Hope Protestant Reformed Christian School was established by Christian parents in 1947. The basis of our school and its instruction is God's covenant with believers and their children. Since these children belong to Him, God has called believing parents to train their covenant children in the same God-honoring environment in the school as in the home and the church.

In maintaining Hope Protestant Reformed Christian School, parents have manifested their belief that the education of covenant children must serve to prepare them to follow their lifelong calling to reveal the glory of their God in a life lived from the principle of regeneration by grace. Hope School is first of all a Reformed institution where children are nurtured in a God-honoring and Christ-serving environment by God-fearing teachers, and the instruction is based on the infallible, inspired, written Word of God.

A noble calling and task confronts all of us again as we embark on the 78th year of covenantal instruction at Hope School. How can the mission of the school be accomplished? It will take generous financial giving by many supporters to meet the budgeted needs to operate the school, dedicated service and wise oversight and decisions by the Board of Directors, parents and teachers working together to provide the biblical instruction necessary for the children to develop their gifts to the glory of God, and children who receive the instruction while exercising diligence in their studies and kindness toward their school mates. And it will take much prayer. For we know that unless the Lord bestows His blessing on the work, we labor in vain. So pray fervently "Lord bless the work and establish the work of our hands". Then and only then will the mission of the good Christian school be accomplished.





School Cancellation

When school is cancelled or delayed due to inclement or other emergencies, a mass email notification will be sent out to all families. Cancellations will be broadcast over WOOD TV and also reported on their website. If reason arises to shorten the school day after classes are in session, all parents will be contacted.

During 3-day Kindergarten years, if school is cancelled on Monday, classes will be held on Tuesday. If school is cancelled on a Wednesday, classes will be held on Thursday. Friday cancellations will not be made up.

Personal Electronic Devices

Students must have all personal electronic devices not specifically used for teacher approved academic work, turned off and out of use during school hours, including recess. First time violations will have the device brought to the office and returned at the end of the day. With subsequent violations, the device will only be returned to a parent.

Athletic Eligibility Policy

Those students who fail one or more subjects in a six-week period are ineligible to participate in interscholastic sports for a period of two weeks. After this period, their grades will be recalculated to determine their eligibility. Also, those students who have multiple D's will be subject to junior high staff evaluation to determine their eligibility.

Participation Policy

Participation in extracurricular athletic or robotics practices and games is restricted to students who have been in school for the entire day. Participation will be allowed for those students who are legitimately excused from class due to necessary appointments or other family emergencies.

Locked Doors

During school hours the building will be locked. Visitors should enter the building through the front doors. The office will buzz visitors in. Students may not let strangers into the building.

<u>Attendance</u>

If your child will not be in school for the day or has an appointment, please notify the school office AND your child's teacher by 8:45AM.

Pick Ups and Drop Offs

SLOW! SLOW! SLOW! Drivers please exercise extreme caution when picking up or dropping off students. Use either the SE parking lot (NOT the front of school area) or the church lot (SW). Please enter through the Hope Church lot and exit out to Riverbend so that all traffic flows the same way. Also leave a lane open on the north side of the parking lots for area walkers and bikers to arrive and depart safely. (Cones will be placed out periodically to help.) Parents, make sure your CCHS drivers know the rules as well. Thanks for your cooperation!

As the summer draws to a close, and we get ready to begin another school year, it is time for the annual Building Committee Report. There were several larger projects to occupy the committee's time the past few months, and there is always plenty of work to be done if one looks around hard enough. The carpet in the 3rd grade classroom was in need of replacement so the old carpet was torn out by volunteers at our summer workbee on June 8 and new carpet has been installed. We had a great turnout for the workbee this year, and we would like to express our appreciation to all who gave of their time to help out once again. There were many small projects that day, and with willing participation, the work was completed quickly. The projects at the work bee included: disassembling the ga-ga pit, prepping the steel handrails by the gym entry for new paint, removing old mulch in the front landscaping, removing some bushes at the rental property, sending some old desks from the storage barn to Grace Church's scrap metal drive, removing some hallway ceiling tiles for an upcoming AC project, sealing the exterior walls of the large gym with masonry sealer, and spreading some top soil on the soccer field.

At the time of this writing, the Building Committee anticipates having air conditioning installed in the K-2nd, 7th, and 8th grade classrooms by the time school begins. This will be a great addition for the beginning and end of each school year when the heat makes work difficult for teachers and students alike. Another project some of you may have noticed on the school grounds is the work being done by the County Drain Commission. We thank Hank for his willingness to help and take this opportunity to let all of you know that we are looking for a new techy person to take over our tech maintenance needs. We thank Matt Elzinga, who is returning to lead the program and also thank Matt Rutgers and Ben Petroelje for stepping up to coach alongside him. Matt Moelker, a CCHS senior, has agreed to assist them. This season begins with a kick-off meeting on August 27 at 7PM in the music room and runs through November. All interested 7th and 8th graders are welcome to come.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

As the summer draws to a close and we look ahead to another school year, we hope that you had a time of refreshment. What a beautiful summer it has been! The weather was very enjoyable and seeing God's creation at full bloom brings life and joy to the heart. If you are anything like our family, you let your kids enjoy that beautiful creation way too long into the evening. It is hard to say goodbye to summer but with it comes the excitement of another school year ahead and hopefully some time of relaxation for our hard-working mothers.

The Finance Committee is gearing up for yet another school year. Our fiscal year starts on July 1 so we closed out last year's numbers and began anew. This issue of the *Highlights* contains the 2023-2024 financial statement. We are pleased to report that we ended the fiscal year with a surplus of \$52,152.73. The drive surpassed its goal by over \$27,000 and church collections surpassed its goal by almost \$4,000. The income that we receive from PR Special Education is 15% of the expense of the Resource Room. We are very thankful for the work that PR Special Education does and for the support that they give to our school. The reason we received about \$3,000 over our budget is due to one additional late payment for last year coming in this fiscal year. To God be the glory for the continued financial support of Hope PRC School.

We set the deadline for enrollment for July 8 this year. It is the 2nd year in a row that we have set it earlier in July. This allows us to be better prepared for the beginning of the school year. This forces all of you to begin thinking about tuition already before the half way point of the summer. We appreciate you taking care of this for us even when you may be on vacation. The Finance Committee met at school on July 8 to review enrollment forms which had been mailed in or dropped off. There were a few late arrivals so we finalized enrollment in the weeks following and processed payment then. We have 80 families that have enrolled this year which is up 3 families from the beginning of last year.

You should have received your first tuition statement on August 12 for the 2024-2025 school year. Please contact Josh Meulenberg if you did not receive the statement, or if there was incorrect information. We ask that you make it a priority to stay current on tuition throughout the upcoming school year. Many new families have chosen to take advantage of the monthly EFT. We are glad that we can offer this as a convenient way to pay tuition. Please reach out soon if you would like to be added to that list.

As we look forward to another time of school, we ask that you take time to praise and thank the Lord for the wonderful gift, He has given, called Hope PRC School. God has blessed us in many ways, one of which has been financially. "Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name. For the Lord is good; his mercy is everlasting, and his truth endureth to all generations." Psalm 100:4-5

TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE REPORT

Transportation is something we do not take lightly as we look forward to a new school year. We pray God will grant safety to the children, parents and staff as they travel to and from school each day. Busses are one of the safest forms of transportation for our children and we are happy to report that we have two full bus routes this year. One that travels through the Standale/Coopersville area, and one through Grandville, Jenison and Jamestown (including afternoon shuttle service from CCHS to Heritage).

We have also been blessed with a new fulltime bus driver this year, Carol Boeve. She went through many hours of studying and testing to become certified. We can't thank her enough for the time and effort she put into this, and her willingness to make time each day to take the children to and from school. We have no doubt she will be used as a blessing to the children that get the privilege of riding on her route. She will be driving the Grandville/ Jenison/ Jamestown route, and for the Standale/ Coopersville route Jen Kalsbeek will primarily drive in the morning and Dan Kuiper the afternoon. We are also thankful to Jen Kalsbeek for stepping in as supervisor and doing an amazing job for the past year, and being willing to take on the task again this year. We are currently looking for a replacement for Jen for the 2025-26 school year, and would like to find that individual as soon as possible.

The school also purchased a used bus (#17) this year that will be used to replace bus 15. Both bus 16 and bus 17 will have new Angel Trax camera systems in them as well. We intend to keep bus 15 for the time being, to be used when needed for field trips and for Covenant's use as needed. We want to make sure our bus fleet is running solid for a few months before we considering selling bus 15.

We also ask parents of children riding the buses to review the transportation policies. These are set in place, primarily, for the safety of the children and the drivers. We also ask that you talk to the children about being respectful to the driver and the other students while riding the bus. May they let their light shine even as they commute together to and from school, and may this time also be an opportunity to glorify God in the way that they act and the way that they treat one another, as well as those who have been put in places of authority.

Parents dropping their children off at school, we ask that you use the Hope Church parking lot, if possible. Enter the parking lot through the west entrance up by the church, off Ferndale, and exit through the south exit, nearer to the school, to Riverbend. If you use the parking lot on the southeast side of the school, near the south entrance, park in a parking spot. This way you do not block the way for buses and other vehicles.

May God lead and guide us as we look forward to another year of instruction for His children.

TIME FLIES Mrs. Faith Kalsbeek, 6th Grade

All of my life I've heard the phrase "time flies." This phrase has grown more relevant to me for a number of reasons. First, the phrase itself seems to become more and more true the older I become. Every summer seems to pass by a little more quickly than the one preceding it. This was certainly true this year! I felt as though summer was only beginning when, lo and behold, it was August and time to start thinking about the return to school.

Perhaps the reason that my summer has flown by can be attributed to the part of the phrase that I left out– "time flies...when you're having fun." This summer has indeed been exciting and eventful. I spent the first three weeks of summer finalizing the plans for my wedding; on June 27th I got married, then vacationed in Mexico for a week. It was a lovely trip in spite of delays and tropical storms. Upon our return, we got to make ourselves at home in a new space...so new, in fact, that we lived for a few weeks with no counter tops or kitchen appliances! We are now adept at using our griddle, air fryer, and propane camping stove to cook meals. With all of the joy and excitement, of course time passed quickly.

The second reason that "time flies" has become more significant to me is because of the material that I teach. In 6th grade we spend some time studying figurative language. Good authors use figurative language to make writing more interesting, to add humor, or to emphasize a certain point. I would consider "time flies" to contain the figurative language of personification–flying is a human(ish) ability that is attributed to a non-human thing. I would also consider "time flies" to be an idiom. An idiom is a phrase with a specific meaning which is different from what the phrase literally says. For instance, the phrase "it's raining cats and dogs" does not literally mean that cats and dogs are falling from the sky, but instead means that it is raining hard. "Time flies" is similar: time is not literally soaring through the air, rather it passes by quickly. Teaching has led me to pay special attention to things I used to consider normal, such as the phrase "time flies," in my daily life in hopes that it can be applied in the classroom.

Teaching has also opened my eyes to spiritual applications of many normal things. For instance, the Bible is filled with figurative language–even figurative language that relates to time. Psalm 103:15a uses a simile (a comparison using "like" or "as") to talk about how brief the time of a man is: "As for man, his days are as grass." Here, "days" and "grass" are being compared. Just as the grass withers and dies quickly, so the life of man is for but a moment; we are pilgrims and strangers. This fact gives urgency to our calling to love and serve our God *now*. We cannot save it for later, as our lives are too short.

Our time flies by, so let us pray that we might use it always, but especially in this school year, to learn of and serve our Heavenly Father.

A HOUSE DIVIDED AGAINST ITSELF CANNOT STAND

Even the youngest of school-aged children have some familiarity with the government of the United States through hearing their parents pray for their leaders or speak about the upcoming elections. I have heard many voice their concerns about our presidential candidates. Many topics are being hotly debated: abortion, immigration, taxes, and Israel to name but a few. No one looking at the United States can honestly say that we are a united people; unless it is to say that we are united in selfishness -- for our own wants and desires.

This reminds me of a time in US history that was also chaotic, where the Union was also divided over various issues such as states' rights, slavery, and tariffs. Indeed, a now-famous series of debates was organized between two candidates, Stephen Douglas and Abraham Lincoln, each vying for election to the US Senate. In one of these debates, Abraham Lincoln stated the following, "A house divided against itself, cannot stand. I believe this government cannot endure permanently half slave and half free. I do not expect the Union to be dissolved – I do not expect the house to fall – but I do expect it will cease to be divided. It will become all one thing or all the other."¹ In other words, Lincoln realized that the issue of slavery would soon be decided. There can only be so much debate, so much discussion, so much controversy before the lines would have to fall one way or the other. In this case, this happened not very long afterward. While Lincoln lost the Illinois senatorial race to Douglas, he was later elected president, leading the country through the attempted secession of various southern states and the ensuing Civil War.

What can we learn from this? How can these historical parallels lead us as we make decisions and move forward? How does this affect the various 'spheres' of life? These are excellent questions to consider. However, to answer them, we must not turn to the foolish wisdom of mere man, but the perfect knowledge and loving guidance of our God and Father. "And if a kingdom be divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house be divided against itself, that house cannot stand" (Mark 3:24-25). Many other passages in Scripture speak of the dangers of a lack of unity. Let us take heed and not fall brother upon brother to harm and to hurt with words and with deeds.

Rather, let us carefully consider a proper way to learn from our differences and move forward. Therefore we must get to the heart of the matter by asking, "Why are we a house divided?" Why do we distrust another? Why is there anger among friends? In the school setting, a teacher may ask "Why are you arguing?" when two students disagree on the playground because while it is important to stop the outer behavior of arguing or fighting, it is also important to address the heart issues causing the fighting. Secondly, we must each decide if it is necessary to fight over the matter. Is this the hill that you want to die on? Is the color of the carpet at church worth the destruction of a friendship? And finally, if we fail to agree with one another, how ought we to reveal that disagreement? Are we distancing ourselves from that person or their viewpoint? Are we "speaking the truth in love"?

Now, as we look to the future of our country, we should not expect the lines to fall in pleasant places. Wars and rumors of wars will likely only increase. Yet, let that not be a reason for us to stop fighting the good fight or running the race that God has set out for us in this life. Let us continue to seek to be that house unified, to find our home and family in our Father who has adopted us for the sake of our brother and Savior, our Lord Jesus Christ.

BILL'S BUGS

Mosquitoes are the deadliest animal on the planet, carrying and transmitting a number of diseases that claim the lives of millions of people each year. Because of this, various attempts have been made to either control populations of mosquitoes or eliminate their disease-carrying abilities. In the last three or so years, advancements in genetic engineering, an area of biology 7th grade science students will learn about and discuss this year, have made it possible to minimize the ability of mosquitoes to carry and transmit some of the worst diseases, especially dengue fever. By genetically modifying mosquitoes through injecting Wolbachia bacteria into them, future generations of mosquitoes born from the modified breed stock will either breed and lay eggs that can't hatch or have offspring that contain the bacteria which stops the transmission of viruses. A company called Oxitec, which received a large grant from Bill Gates, released 2.4 billion modified mosquitoes in California and Florida a couple years ago. Other companies in South America are also modifying and releasing millions of mosquitoes into the environment. One lab in Medellin, Columbia, also apparently supported by Bill Gates, breeds and releases 40 million mosquitoes weekly (check out "The Mosquito Factory" on YouTube if interested). Data in some areas show that up to 95% of dengue cases were eliminated in areas where the modified mosquitoes were released, so there does seem to be a good possibility that this method of disease alleviation could actually work. Of course, no one knows the long-term impact on ecosystems or the potential harm that could eventually come from putting modified organisms into the environment. What we do know is that subjects like genetic engineering raise many ethical/moral questions for Christians, another area 7^{th} grade students will explore and discuss. What we also know is that men cannot help but use their technological advancements, apparently with little or no restraint. Finally, we also know that God will use even this for His purpose, the purpose of judging the wicked and gathering the just. How far men will go with genetic engineering remains to be seen; for us, the power and complex designs revealed in this technology give us more reason to marvel at the amazing creation our God has made.

EXECUTIVE SKILLS

Over the summer, I have been doing a lot of reading: some reading for pleasure, but even more reading to learn. I wanted to learn more about my students, about new theories of education and brain development, and about different strategies to help my students overcome challenges and succeed in school. Yes, I have done plenty of relaxing, but I've kept my brain thinking and growing. Here, I am going to share a summary of what I learned and have taken away from one of the books I read this summer, Smart but Scattered: The Revolutionary "Executive Skills" Approach to Helping Kids Reach Their Potential.

Is your child smart but scattered? Do they find success in academics, but struggle to find that one book they took home from school last week that is lost in their messy room? Does your student clearly understand how to do the math problems, but they can't sit and focus on their work for more than a minute if you aren't sitting right next to them? Is it extremely difficult for your child to adjust or be flexible when plans change, even only slightly? If any of these scenarios sound familiar, your child may lack skills, specifically executive skills. These executive skills are the fundamental brain-based skills required to independently execute tasks. Your young child simply just doesn't yet know how to perform these tasks on their own, and that is where parents and teachers need to step in to help them learn.

There are 11 different executive skills that children develop, starting already in the first 6 to 12 months of life and on through early elementary school. The following is the list of these executive skills with a short definition, given in the general order of how these skills develop over a child's lifetime.

- Response Inhibition- capacity to think before acting and resist the urge to say or do something before evaluating the situation
- Working Memory- ability to hold information in memory while performing complex tasks and draw on past experiences to apply to a situation at hand
- Emotional Control- ability to manage emotions to complete tasks and control behavior
- Sustained Attention- capacity to keep paying attention despite distractions, fatigue, or boredom
- Task Initiation- ability to begin projects in a timely manner
- Planning/Prioritization- ability to create a plan for accomplishing a task or meeting a goal, including deciding what is important to focus on
- Organization- ability to create and maintain systems of organization
- Time Management- capacity to estimate how much time one has, how to use that time, and how to stay within time limits
- Goal-Directed Persistence- capacity to have a goal and follow through to completion over a period of time
- Flexibility- ability to revise plans in the face of obstacles and adapt to changing conditions without major distress
- Metacognition- ability to monitor, evaluate, and critique yourself with the goal of improvement

Now that you have a general understanding of these important executive skills that your child needs to meet the demands typically placed on children their age, you might wonder how to go about helping your child improve the skill areas where they are lagging or have weaknesses. This book provides many tips, tricks, and examples of how to help your child for each of the 11 different executive skills. I am just going to summarize some of the general guidelines that can apply to all of the skills.

- 1. **Teach** the lagging skills rather than expecting your child to simply learn through observation.
- 2. Understand what is normal at your child's developmental level- don't expect too much from them too early.
- 3. You can make changes to the environment, the task, or the way you interact with your child to help them achieve the desired end result. (Common example: if your child struggles to focus on homework when working in their room, have them sit somewhere you can monitor them)
- 4. Practice difficult tasks in **small steps** and increase the demand gradually as they have success.
- 5. Build in choices to give your child some control.
- 6. Use incentives to augment instruction. Incentives make the effort of learning and performing a skill more desirable. Incentives do not have to be toys or candy...

- 7. Provide just enough support for the child to be successful. Keep the support and supervision in place until the child has mastered the skill. Only then should you gradually fade the support (don't abruptly end it).
- 8. If your child is old enough, discuss your concerns with them and include them in the work of creating a plan for how to improve their lagging skill.
